Comments	<p>I have been walking in Pallingshurst Woods for the last 40 years, with my parents as a child and then with my husband and my own children. This area is completely natural, remote and tranquil, with varied animal life and the pollution and noise will completely destroy this.</p> <p>For many reasons I object to this application but above all for the noise, suitability, pollution and disruption to our access to public rights of way. Specifically:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. The untold damage to the wildlife habitat - far out-reaching than the proposed site - but also along the land providing access to the site.2. Loss of tranquillity3. Pollution including in particular NOISE pollution4. Loss of public footpaths5. Destruction of a beautiful areas of woodland6. Impact on wildlife (there are badger sets within 5 metres of the HGV lorry route)7. Access to the site via woodland tracks which will cause damage to further areas of the woodland, above and beyond the clay pit site.8. Increase in dangerous traffic/HGV lorries on very minor roads which are already in disrepair and were never intended for the use of large, fully-laden lorries.9. I also understand that there is no actual need for additional clay resources - so the main argument for destroying an area of natural beauty is spurious and not one of need but of profit.10. I am most concerned that the land will be used as a waste site, with debris and potential poisons left in the ground to cause long term ill-effects.11. I am also aware that last year in Dec 2020 West Sussex County Council introduced a tree plan with one of its aims to protect trees and woodlands from new developments and other threats. If this application were to be granted this would be in direct opposition to the council's own policy.12. Furthermore, if this was to go-ahead it would contravene two of the goals of the Cop26 conference being held in Glasgow (i.e. 1) to adapt to protect communities and natural habitats and 2) curtail deforestation), in November by the British Government.
